
Feast of Weeks

The Jewish holiday calendar in the Old Testament included solemn feasts that all Jewish men were required to attend each year in Jerusalem. The Feast of Weeks was the second of these events. It is first mentioned in Exodus 34:22-23 which states, "You shall observe the Feast of Weeks, the firstfruits of wheat harvest, and the Feast of Ingathering at the year's end. Three times in the year shall all your males appear before the LORD God, the God of Israel." The Hebrew term for this special time was *shavout* meaning "weeks." The Feast of Weeks took place seven full weeks or the fiftieth day following the Feast of First Fruits. It was also known as Pentecost, a word

2. This holiday was celebrated 50 days after Passover. According to John 19:31, the Jewish leaders were in a rush to have the bodies taken down from their crosses so they could celebrate a special Sabbath. Acts 1:3 tells us Jesus was with his disciples between his resurrection and his ascension for 40 days. Approximately how many days has it been since his ascension?

meaning fifty. Pentecost was also a day that would later become important to Christians as the birth of the church in Acts 2.

The Feast of Weeks commemorated the first fruits of the wheat harvest, a celebration of God's provision. As one of the harvest feasts, God's people were instructed to present grain offerings to the Lord (Leviticus 23:16). In addition, they were to offer several one-year old lambs without blemish, one young bull, and two rams, in addition to other offerings. Interestingly, the field harvesters were to leave the corners untouched in order for the poor and immigrants to gather food for themselves: "And when you reap the harvest of your land, you shall not reap your field right up to its edge, nor shall you gather the gleanings after your harvest. You shall leave them for the poor and for the sojourner: I am the LORD your God" (Leviticus 23:22).

➤ Acts 2:22-24

"Fellow Israelites, listen to this: Jesus of Nazareth was a man accredited by God to you by miracles, wonders and signs, which God did among you through him, as you yourselves know. ²³This man was handed over to you by God's deliberate plan and foreknowledge; and you, with the help of wicked men, put him to death by nailing him to the cross. ²⁴But God raised him from the dead, freeing him from the agony of death, because it was impossible for death to keep its hold on him."

"Therefore let all Israel be assured of this: God has made this Jesus, whom you crucified, both Lord and Messiah."

“When the people heard this, they were cut to the heart and said to Peter and the other apostles, ‘Brothers, what shall we do?’ Peter replied, ‘Repent and be baptized, every one of you, in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins. And you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit.’³⁹ The promise is for you and your children and for all who are far off—for all whom the Lord our God will call.’⁴⁰ With many other words he warned them: and he pleaded with them, ‘Save yourselves from this corrupt generation.’⁴¹ Those who accepted his message were baptized, and about three thousands were added to their number that day.”

Application
