- 1. Read Ezra 4-6 or listen to it read aloud on your YouVersion app. These chapters are filled with much treasure. Don't forget to stop and ask God to open your heart to all he has for you.
- 2. As is the case with most large reconstruction projects, there was some opposition. According to Ezra 4:1, who stood up offering to help in this building project?

What powerful word was used to describe these men. They were not comrades,
friends, or brothers, they are of Judah and Benjamin.
3. Fill in the blanks. "Let us build because, like you, we
seek God" Do you believe these people loved and served Jehovah as the One true God?
Or are they merely adding Him to their worship along with all the other gods they chose to serve?
4. These people were not Israelites. They may have been some of the peoples forced to live in the land when Assyria took the Israelites captive back to Assyria. A common practice of that day was to remove the nationals and place others in the land. Their forefathers had been brought to Israel by Esarhaddon king of Assyria. After reading the chapter, what do you think might have been the motive behind offering to help?
5. What was the response of Zerubbabel, Joshua, and the heads of the families to this request?
6. After having their request denied, they show their true intent very quickly. What did they do? Read Ezra 4:4-5.

8. Even as I am writing this, I too have experienced meeting with obstacles after following God's call. Even when these obstacles seem insurmountable, we must continue doing what God has called us to do and allow our gracious God to work out the details. Discouragement sits at the door waiting for an opportunity to rush in and plant fear. If every divine assignment were easy, we would never get a chance to see God move on our behalf. Like the Israelites, we must continue our God given assignment and not allow our work to be frustrated by the enemy.

Read James 1:2-7. What has God called you to do?

Are you experiencing problems and opposition?

How do you handle discouragement, fear, and frustration?



9. Discouragement and fear are two of Satan's favorite tools. Read Joshua 1:9, Deuteronomy 31:8, and John 16:33. What are believers to do when these two come our way?

While in a locksmith's store I read a sign that said, "Don't give up, it is usually the last key you try that opens the door."

10. Charles Stanley said, "Disappointment is inevitable. But to become discouraged is a choice I make. God would never discourage me. He always points me to himself to trust him. Therefore, my discouragement is from Satan."

What are we to do with temptations from the evil one?

Read Matthew 4:4, 7, 10 to help you answer this question. Ask yourself, what would Jesus do?



- 11. There are times when our setbacks bring discouragement. But we must remember that setbacks can be redirected, and they can be a set up for what God has in store for us today. How might a setback be redirected and make it an opportunity to bring God glory?
- 12. Fear can be a motivating force to keep us from danger or it can be crippling, leaving us without hope. My sweet friend Rene' loves to encourage others with these words; "God has never failed me in the past and I do not believe he will start now."

It is important for us to check our focus when fear comes our way. Think of the last time you were struck by fear; did you focus on the size of the problem or the size of our good God?

What helps you focus when you experience fear?

- 13. Think about the last time you were frustrated. Often it is an unreal expectation that has caused frustration.
- We expect a situation to go in a particular direction, but it does not.
- We expect someone to do or say something and they do not.
- We expect an outcome to our actions, and it does not happen.

These can all be frustrating. What can we do?

14. The next section of scripture can be confusing. These are letters to and from King Artaxerxes. The Bible Knowledge Commentary notes say, "They show that the opposition Ezra had begun to describe (vss. 1-5) continued for many years to 485 BC, the year Xerxes began to reign (vs. 6) and on into the days of Artaxerxes

(464-424 BC). Artaxerxes was the king who was reigning during the events recorded in chapters 7-10."

Ezra 4:6 tells us of a written accusation brought against God's people. The letter was sent to King Artaxerxes. Skip down to Ezra 4:11-16, the letter suggests that their only reason for writing is their concern for their king's welfare. This sounds very noble, as though they have only the king's interest at heart. Specifically, what did they say they wanted the king to know?

15. What was their word of warning to the king? Read Ezra 4:13-16. In their opinion, what will be the outcome if the king does not step in and put a stop to all this?

16. Those writing this letter want the king to believe they are thinking only of his best interest. Look at verses 12-15, how are the people of Jerusalem described? How far back in history did these men go to make their point?

Hint: How long were the Israelites in captivity in Babylon?

17. What did King Artaxerxes find when his historians looked back in the history books concerning the people of Jerusalem?

What orders did he send? (Ezra 4:19-22)



18. To a conquering king, the Israelites would look like a difficult people to rule. But who was to be the only true king to rule over Israel?

19. Circumstances are sometimes out of our control. That is what we see here. King Artaxerxes called for a halt to the rebuilding process. Think of the last time you were proceeding with a task you felt God had clearly instructed you to do and, for whatever reason, the work had to stop. What was your attitude?

20. When we experience a situation like this, it would be good for us to think back to the Israelites as they stood looking at the Red Sea with the Egyptians headed straight for them. Moses told the people, "Do not be afraid. Stand firm and you will see the deliverance the LORD will bring you today." Have you experienced a divine deliverance?



21. What usually happens when a great work is put on hold?

- 22. It can be hard to gain momentum after a long period of inactivity.
- Have you ever been in a boat which had to be rowed to shore?
- Have you ever had to push a stalled car out of traffic into a parking lot?
- Have you ever been in a race that was suspended even for a few minutes?

Each of these scenarios is easier with momentum. What should we do when we find ourselves struggling to get going again?



- 23. One of my favorite leadership teachers, John Maxwell said, "Momentum solves 80% of your problems." He went on to say, "While a good leader sustains momentum, a great leader increases it." What are you doing to increase the momentum of those in your inner circle to achieve great things for God? This should make for great discussion in your small group.
- 24. Ezra 4:24 picks back up where it left off in verse 5. The result of the opposition during Cyrus' reign was that work on the temple was suspended until what year?
- 25. Ezra 5:2-3 tells us that two leaders stepped up to finish the work. They were joined by two prophets. Who were the four men of conviction who stepped up to finish the work?
- **26.** No sooner had they started than they were called aside and questioned. What was the question they were asked?

Read Mark 11:27-28, who is being questioned in these verses?

Have you experienced someone questioning your authority?

Good leaders seek direction from God and do not allow others doubts to persuade them to stop. That is the wonderful thing about following God's direction, we can proceed with confidence.

Read Psalm 37:23-24 and Proverbs 4:10-12, 18. What is the promise?

27. Read Ezra 5:5. We all operate under certain earthly authorities. It is important to live in compliance as much as possible. But ultimately there is One who rules in the affairs of men. He is to be obeyed with great care. What important detail is recorded in Ezra 5:5 that allowed them to continue their work?

It is imperative that we know the will of our God and walk in obedience to Him. When we do, we have nothing to fear.



- 28. Ezra 5:6-17 contains the letter written by the men who opposed the rebuilding of the temple. Look closely at verse 8, what facts did they share with King Darius in their letter?
- 29. Ezra 5:11-13 contains the answer given by Zerubbabel, Joshua, Haggai, and Zechariah when they were questioned. Who did they say authorized their work?

33. Even more than merely granting permission for the work to proceed, King Darius gave further orders. What did he tell them to do?

- 34. Read Ezra 6:10, King Darius generously supplied so they could offer sacrifices pleasing to God. What did he want them to do for him?35. How serious was the order of King Darius? Read Ezra 6:11
- **36.** Would you say King Darius was just a great guy or is there another reason he allowed the work to continue? Read Proverbs 21:1
- 37. King Cyrus made his decree in 538 BC. (Ezra 1:1) This was the first year after he became ruler of Babylon. In 536 BC the actual building of the temple began. It was the second year after their return to Jerusalem. (Ezra 3:8) The temple work halted. (Ezra 4:23) The temple restoration work restarted. (Ezra 6:13-15) The work was completed in 516 BC (Ezra 6:15), the sixth year of the reign of King Darius. Make a timeline, add the events seen so far in the book of Ezra.

Question 8 - James 1:2-7
