1. Please read Luke 2, at least twice. Ask God to open your eyes, ears and heart to all the wonderful treasure to be found.
2. Who is the ruler mentioned in verse 1?
3. Rome controlled the world, at this time, and ruled with an iron fist. After many years of wars on land and sea, the area surrounding the Mediterranean Sea had political unity. Under the rule of Caesar Augusta, the Roman Empire became the greatest power of the known world. We are told Caesar issued a decree, which ordered a census to be taken. Why do you believe Rome would care how many Jewish people were living in the land of Israel?

What are some reasons for a census?

4. For many years, Rome prided itself on being a republic – a nation governed by laws. The ruler Octavius would change all that. In 27 BC, Octavius arranged for the Roman Senate to give him the title “Augustus,” which means ‘exalted’ and ‘sacred.’ At this time, Rome was an empire, governed by an emperor. Caesar Augustus became the first Emperor of Rome. With this ruler we see an example of the way power corrupts and people suffer. As a person’s power increases, their moral sense diminishes. It has been said, “Power corrupts; absolute power corrupts absolutely.” Why do you believe this happens?

5. This decree for a census must have been a very serious thing. Joseph traveled with his espoused wife, who was great with child. The Romans may have thought they were in control, but in reality, this brought about the fulfilment of the prophesy spoken by Micah.

What was the sign they had found the Messiah?

24. Verse 13 mentions the appearance of a “great heavenly host”, these were angels as well. The Greek word for host is *stratia*, meaning ‘army,’ such as an army encamped. One commentary said, “...it was thousands and thousands.”
What were these angels doing?
25. The shepherds wasted no time going to find this baby lying in a manger. Did they find him?

What did they do with the information they had been given?

26. Are you moved to share the good news you have?

When you experience a treasure from God’s word, are you ready to talk about it with others around you?

27. We do not want to miss Mary’s response to all that was happening.
What did the scripture tell us she did?

28. What does it mean to ‘...treasure and ponder?’

29. What was the response of the shepherds to all they had seen and heard?

Day Four

30. Have you ever been so moved by an experience with Jesus, it caused you to respond like the shepherds?
31. Verse 21 tells us it was the eighth day after Jesus' birth. Where did Mary and Joseph take him?
32. This was a very important ceremony. Read Genesis 17:9-14 (key verse is 11) and Acts 7:8. Why was this such an important ceremony for the Israelites?
33. In verses 25-32, we are introduced to a man. What is his name and what did you learn about him?
34. Where was Simeon when he met Jesus?

Did you notice the scripture said he had been "waiting for the Consolation of Israel."

This was a messianic title. The word consolation is the Greek word Paraklesis- one who is called or summoned, (esp. for help) admonition, encouragement, comfort, solace; that which affords comfort or refreshment thus of the Messianic salvation.

35. Simeon praised God, for he had gotten to see the One who had been promised. Why do you suppose someone like Simeon got to see and recognize the Messiah, while so many others missed his birth?
36. Have you noticed that we often find things we are looking for, and we miss some very important things when we are distracted? What has your attention today? Would you say you have your mind set on things above?
37. Notice who is included in Simeon's words of blessing...all nations. God's purpose for the people of Israel was to be a light to all other nations, pointing them to God. God is not only the God of the Jews, but the sovereign God of the universe. What do you believe Simeon meant, when he said, "...a light for revelation to the Gentiles and the glory of your people Israel"?
38. In Luke 2:34-35, what difficult prophetic news did Simeon share with Mary, on that day?
39. Luke 2:34 refers to Jesus as a sign.

Jesus came as a sign of God's everlasting and unending love for his creation. Sadly, because of his meek and humble ways and their own prideful hearts, many would not recognize his deity. What comes to your mind and heart when you think of Jesus?

Have you accepted his gift of salvation?

Have you placed your trust in Him?

I understand if that is not something you have done. However, I encourage you to pause long enough to seriously consider why not. Be honest with yourself. You have everything to gain, and nothing to lose, except the guilt and shame of sin. If you hear a voice trying to persuade you to ignore this invitation, let me tell you that is not the voice of a friend. That is the voice of your enemy, Satan, who wants you to miss out on a loving relationship with God.

42. Mary, Joseph and the baby Jesus left Jerusalem and went home, to Nazareth. Luke 2:40 *tell us that Jesus “...grew and became strong; he was filled with wisdom.”* Jesus had a normal childhood and grew up just as all children. He grew physically each year, as boys do. He grew in his mind, will and emotions. God’s grace was increasingly upon him.
This should be the desire of our heart as a parent to see our children, not only grow physically but, grow stronger every year in their relationship with God, the Father.

When Jesus was 12 years old, he went with his parents and many other family members to celebrate the Passover in Jerusalem, as was their annual custom. When the celebration was over, and they were traveling home, Mary and Joseph began to worry, since they had not seen Jesus all day. After looking among their family members and friends traveling with them and not finding him, they returned to Jerusalem.
How long had he been missing when they located him?

- What did his questions show?
